If you read with your child just 30 minutes a day, he/she will be exposed to more than 900 hours of literacy learning

before kindergarten.



Rereading familiar stories enhances your child's understanding. Read it

again!



Babies need more than

"baby talk." Use real words

and names to describe the

world around you.



Read with enthusiasm!

Create different voices for

each character. Don't be

afraid to be silly.



Stop reading every now and then to discuss what's happening. Ask your child to make predictions about the

story.



Talk about the pictures!

Introduce your child to the names of unfamiliar

things.



Scribbling is an early form of writing. Ask your child to "read" what he or she has written.



Clay and playdough can help your child develop the muscles he/she needs to write. Make those fingers

strong!

interests. Visit the library and find books that match!



Your baby is learning words even before he/she can say them. Talk to your baby.

Explain the things you are

doing together.

Play a rhyming game.

Name a word and see if your child can name others

that rhyme with it.



Have a "written

initial sounds.



Want to find books your child will love? Talk to a children's librarian. They're there to help!



Play word games as you drive. Pick a letter and see how many words you can name that begin with its

sound.

Expose your preschooler to

new words daily.

# First Steps Early Literacy Tip: Look for books with simple,

repetitive patterns. As you

read encourage your child

finish your sentences.



Share sturdy, "board books"

with your infant/toddler.

Don't be surprised if they

chew on them. This is how

babies explore.



Read to your baby, even before it seems he/she will understand. Your voice is helping your baby's brain

develop.



No book? No problem!

Make up a story together.



Add labels to household

items to help your child

make connections

between spoken and written

language.



Take a "picture walk" before you read. Ask your child to make predictions about what will happen in the

story.



As you read, track the text with your finger. This will help your child develop important insights as to how print "works."



As you drive, point out and read signs together with your child.



Encourage your newborn's speech. As he/she "coos and gurgles," talk back, repeating

his/her sounds.



Find real reasons to write!

Make grocery lists and signs.

Write letters and notes.
