What We Do

Each of the six color blocks of the First Steps logo represents a core area of service, outlining our comprehensive strategy to prepare children for long-term school success.

With **measurable outcomes across each of its six school readiness strategy areas**, First Steps is getting results.



Healthy Start

We begin with a focus on providing a healthy start to life. This includes prenatal and post-partum services for both mother and baby. In 2007, First Steps collaborated with key philanthropic and agency partners to bring Nurse-Family Partnership to SC having a significant impact on reducing premature births and Medicaid costs.



Quality Childcare

Quality childcare starts with quality childcare providers. Our quality enhancement and training strategies lead to improved teacher-student interaction, which research shows has a significant impact on a child's development and success in school.



Family Strengthening

Our home visitation strategies, such as Parents as Teachers, Parent-Child Home and Early Steps to School Success, are helping parents understand their responsibilities to care for and be positive models for their children. As a result of First Steps' intervention and parenting support, 66% of clients initially assessed at "low" levels of parenting have achieved moderate or high levels of parenting skill.



Early Education

Private-public partnerships through First Steps 4K have led to significant cost efficiencies in the delivery of publicly funded 4K. One recent analysis suggests First Steps is achieving comparable results, without the need for costly capital construction, for 80 cents on the dollar.



Early Intervention

According to recent federal evaluations, outcomes for clients participating in BabyNet early intervention programs are above national averages. BabyNet matches the special needs of infants and toddlers who have disabilities and/or developmental delays with customized, community-based resources.



School Transition

Each of the corresponding blocks of services leads ultimately to the goal of transitioning children successfully to school. Programs like Countdown to Kindergarten and From Day One to Grade One are ultimately preparing children for school success.

Based on the needs of our community, Edgefield County First Steps focuses its investments in Healthy Start, Family Strengthening, Quality Childcare, and School Transition strategies.

Helping vulnerable first-time mothers empowers them to achieve a better life for themselves and their children.

Program Description

Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) helps transform the lives of vulnerable first-time mothers and their babies. Through ongoing home visits from registered nurses, low-income, first-time moms receive the care and support they need to have a healthy pregnancy, provide responsible and competent care for their children, and become more economically self-sufficient. From pregnancy until the child turns two years old, Nurse-Family Partnership Nurse Home Visitors form a much-needed, trusting relationship with the first-time moms, instilling confidence and empowering them to achieve a better life for their children – and themselves.

In Edgefield County, Nurse-Family Partnership is implemented through Carolina Health Centers, Inc.



Edgefield First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our NFP families:

- 100% ... live in poverty
- 13% ... did not graduate from high school
- 17% ...were teen mothers

- ✓ 96% of mothers had a medical home
- ✓ 3 mothers graduated upon their child's 2nd birthday

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Family Literacy



Parents are their child's first and best teachers.

Program Description

Family literacy programs offer an integrated and family-friendly approach, helping both parents and children to improve their literacy skills. Family literacy services integrate all of the following:

1. Adult Education
2. Child Education
3. Parent Education
4. Interactive Parent/Child Activities

Our family literacy program:

- ✓ **Helps parents of young children increase their education levels**
- ✓ **Teaches parents how to support their child's literacy and overall development**
- ✓ **Provides quality early learning experiences for children 0-5 while their parents attend adult education**

Edgefield County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our family literacy program families:

- 100% ... live in poverty
- 100% ... didn't graduate high school
- 63% ... enrolled were teen parents

This year, our Family Literacy program:

- ✓ 82% of adults who were post tested made grade level gains (pre to post TABE scores in reading and/or math)
- ✓ 75% of adults who were post tested made gains on the Life Skills Progression (LSP)
- ✓ 90% of children under age 2.5 who were post tested made gains on the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ)
- ✓ 100% of children ages 2.5 to Kindergarten who were post tested made gains on the Peabody Picture Vocabulary Test (PPVT)
- ✓ 100% of children in K-4 or K-5 were promoted to the next grade level

Edgefield County Schools

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Children's reading scores improve dramatically when parents are involved in helping them learn to read.

Program Description

According to the Center on the Developing Child at Harvard University, the peak period for brain development related to language is around **nine months of age. One of the easiest and most effective ways to build this capacity in young children's brains is to read to them.**

Edgefield County First Steps is the local sponsor of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library, which provides free, age-appropriate books to children age birth to 5 years. Operated by the Dollywood Foundation, Imagination Library is currently in more than 1,600 communities internationally and mails books to about 700,000 children each month.

Children who register with Edgefield County First Steps receive one book per month by mail through the month of their fifth birthday. Each book is carefully selected by a committee of educational specialists.



Research shows that reading to a child early and often is one of the best and easiest ways to ensure success in school.

Imagination Library by the Numbers, 2015-16

This year, our Imagination Library program:

- ✓ Provided one book per month to 187 children who were referred from state and local organizations
- ✓ Pre-survey results indicate that 52% of the families enrolled have fewer than 10 books in their homes
- ✓ Post-survey results indicate that 43% of the families enrolled report an increase in the amount of time they spend reading to their children
- ✓ 100% of this program is funded by private donations

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Child Care Training

Those who care for young children need high-quality, accessible, and affordable professional development.

Program Description

High-quality child care hinges on high-quality professional development that meets the needs of the local child care workforce.

First Steps-sponsored training is certified through the SC Center for Child Care Career Development and includes topics in the areas of nutrition, health and safety, curriculum, child guidance, professional development and program administration. Best practices in training include not only the training itself, but follow-up in the classroom.

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Child Care Scholarships

Too many families in Edgefield County cannot afford quality care for their children.

Program Description

Access to quality child care is essential for children while away from their primary caregivers. Yet, of those families income-eligible for child care assistance in South Carolina, only a small fraction receive it due to lack of funds. In the absence of nurturing and consistently available family, friends or neighbors, parents are faced with few - or no - affordable care options.

Edgefield County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our scholarship families:

- 92% ... live in poverty
- 50% ... exposed to parental/caregiver substance abuse
- 3% ... exposed to parental/caregiver depression
- 17% ... exposed to domestic violence

In addition to regular monitoring of child care providers that receive First Steps scholarships, First Steps conducts at least two developmental screenings each year with scholarship children and connects families to needed services within the community.

All of the scholarship children under age 4 are enrolled in our Imagination Library program and receive a book in the mail every month.

Parenting workshops are offered bi-monthly to parents of our scholarship children.

- ✓ Identified and addressed 3 potential developmental delays among scholarship children
- ✓ Made 1 connection for a family for school district special services
- ✓ Supported 2 small businesses in Edgefield County by subsidizing child care tuition for families who would not otherwise be able to afford quality care
- ✓ Provided 7 hours of training for scholarship parents in topics such as quality child care, language and literacy, nutrition, and social emotional development.

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Countdown to Kindergarten

Bringing parents and teachers together as partners sets the foundation for success in school.

Program Description

Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a summer home visitation model connecting rising kindergartners and their families with their future teachers. The program is designed:

- ✓ to forge strong and lasting home-school relationships,
- ✓ to acquaint children and families with the state and classroom expectations to increase the likelihood of school success,
- ✓ to increase parent involvement in the early grades (particularly in hard-to-reach communities), when children's learning is foundational for life success; and
- ✓ to increase public awareness of the importance of school readiness and provide ways for parents and communities to impact children's early school success.

Countdown to Kindergarten integrates all of the following:

Home Visitation. Teachers make six visits over the summer to the homes of participating students and families. Children and families are introduced to actual materials used in kindergarten and are given a Kindergarten Transition Toolkit to keep.

Learning Celebration. The last visit is a "field trip" to the school where the child will attend class in the fall.

Public Awareness. Throughout the summer, First Steps releases tips to media to help parents and caregivers get children ready for kindergarten.



- ✓ According to kindergarten teachers, 100% of CTK parents were more involved than other parents in their child's education
- ✓ 100% of the CTK children were placed in their CTK Teacher's classroom

A Family Literacy Success Story

My name is Tameshia Pressley, and I am a proud mother of three children and a graduate of the class of 2016. I finally “**Did It**”. I attained my GED. It’s been a long journey and a long time coming but every bit worthwhile.

As a young adult, there were many personal struggles and obstacles that tried to block me from obtaining my goals in life. As I became more mature after having my first child, I realized the value of having a high school diploma. The more I searched for job opportunities, the more I realized the value in having a good education. More doors were closed because I didn’t finish high school.

After having my second child, I enrolled her in the local Head Start program. During the Head Start orientation, we received information about receiving our GED through the Adult Education and Family Literacy Program. Getting my GED was very important to me because it would open doors of opportunities for me as well as my family. I always knew I would go back to school to get my GED because I was determined and I wanted to set an example for my three children. I am very grateful for the Family Literacy program. It allowed me the opportunity to go back to school while providing childcare for my child. While receiving instructional support from the Adult Education teachers, my son received early childcare from the preschool teachers.

Thank you to the Edgefield County First Steps Program for making this program possible and available for families like me to accomplish their educational and career goal. I am very grateful for the teachers who have taken the time to help me get to where I need to be.

This is just the beginning - it doesn’t stop here. I would encourage whoever is thinking about going back to school, go back because doors can open, I’m an example. While working towards my goal, I have learned I can do anything I set out to do. Through the hard times I kept the faith because knowing that there’s a light at the end of the tunnel gave me the strength to persevere.

The Edgefield County School District and the Adult Education and Family Literacy Program staff support, encouragement, mentorship, motivation and love inspired me to never give up. At the age of 28, I can now pursue my dream of attending college. In the fall, I will begin classes at Piedmont Technical College’s Edgefield campus. The Family Literacy Program not only makes you want to succeed in life as a young single parent, it also makes you have a goal of saying I can do all things.

In April of 2016, Edgefield County First Steps hosted a community luncheon meeting to discuss early childhood needs and resources in Edgefield County. It was very well attended by staff members from the local school district, DSS, DHEC, BabyNet, Early Head Start, as well as health care providers, local child care providers, and First Steps Board members. This meeting provided the opportunity for networking and, in some cases, for individuals to meet face-to-face for the first time. It also began laying the foundation for the work that is to come. This group has agreed to meet at least twice yearly.

A second meeting of this group is scheduled for October 2016. The first goal will be to assist Edgefield County First Steps with updating its community needs and resources assessment by December 31, 2016. Upon completion of this assessment, this group will begin work on a countywide comprehensive early childhood education plan.

- (5) mobilize communities** to focus efforts on providing enhanced services to support families and their young children so as to enable every child to reach school healthy and ready to succeed.
