Director Message

Aiken County First Steps (ACFS) completed its most recent needs and resources assessment in December 2016. This intense assessment, comprised of two components – **identification of existing community resources and determination of county-wide needs**, helped us to identify the following unmet needs for programs, services and collaborations in our county that promote school readiness: Community awareness – families don't know what services are available, Mental Health Services, barriers to access transportation, particularly in rural areas, and Early Learning Services for underserved populations.



Reflection is one of the most underused yet powerful tools for success. Our intense reflective process drives our **Vision** of every Aiken County child being prepared for success in school, and our **Mission** of collaborating with other early care and education agencies to empower families and caregivers to **prepare their children for school success** by maximizing public and private community resources to deliver, enhance, and expand high-quality early childhood programs. Our vision and mission continue to allow us to serve and contribute to something greater than ourselves.

Our continuous support of early care and education, family strengthening, and school transition programs will positively affect our County's **KRA (Kindergarten Readiness Assessment)** scores. Our children **will be able to** read, write, count, follow rules, ask for help, and demonstrate other skills necessary to function within the kindergarten classroom.

OUR MISSION:

Through collaboration, Aiken County First Steps empowers families and caregivers to **prepare their children for school success** by maximizing public and private community resources to deliver, enhance, and expand high-quality early childhood services.

We get children ready.

THE NEED

School readiness **depends on the capacity of caregivers** to provide children with consistent, nurturing, and responsive relationships in safe, stimulating learning environments, **continuously**, starting at birth. Unfortunately, these quality early childhood experiences happen for too few children in Aiken County.

THE GOALS

Our partnership's work, in collaboration with state and local partners, is focused on advancing Aiken County towards these strategic goals in support of the *Profile of the Ready Kindergartner*, South Carolina's description of school readiness:

- Goal 1:** Increase numbers served from rural areas of the county by engaging local communities and asking community members what they need, not just telling them (all programs).
- Goal 2:** Increase community engagement (involvement in First Steps) – in terms of time, money, clients, collaborations, and in-kind support.
- Goal 3:** Support the early childhood workforce through quality training, incentives, and working with administrators and child care directors.
- Goal 4:** Empower families using a strengths-based/asset-based approach, not a deficit approach. Build trust.
- Goal 5:** Engage and mobilize the community to promote early childhood education programs county-wide.

THE IMPACT

In 2017-18, Aiken County First Steps provided:

- ✓ **27 children and 26 adults with intensive support** to equip parents and caregivers with the confidence and competence to be a child's first and best teacher, and strengthen their family's health, economic, and overall well-being through the Parents as Teachers program.
- ✓ **90 staff** working in **7** child care providers, Head Start centers and preschool classrooms with training, technical assistance, resources and support, **helping them better meet the needs of 350 children ages 0-5 in their care (Freedman ELC, Tiny Treasures, Great Creations, Sunshine House 5, Sunshine House 59, Faith Academy, Betty's Creative Corner).**
- ✓ Financial assistance to help **42 children 0-5 attend quality child care** so their parents can work or attend school (**Child Care Scholarships**).
- ✓ **857 books** to **spark the love of reading for 707 children (Child Care Centers, Schools, Head Start, Babies First Teacher, CTK, Read Across Aiken).**
- ✓ A total of **2007 children and 834 adults** were impacted by Aiken County First Steps programs, resources, activities and events.

School Readiness Outcomes

What is the KRA?

In 2017-18, kindergartners across the state were given for the first time South Carolina’s newest assessment of school readiness: the **Kindergarten Readiness Assessment**, or KRA. The KRA provides a snapshot of students’ abilities at the beginning of the school year, in four domains: Social Foundations, Language and Literacy, Mathematics, and Physical Development and Well-Being. Here are the results locally and for the state:

- 1. Language and Literacy:** reading, writing, speaking, and listening
- 2. Mathematics:** counting, comparison, and sorting
- 3. Physical Well-Being & Motor Development:** dexterity, muscular coordination, and balance
- 4. Social Foundations:** following rules, asking for help, task persistence and other skills necessary to function within the kindergarten classroom

Demonstrating Readiness: student demonstrates foundational skills and behaviors that prepare him/her for instruction based on kindergarten standards.

Approaching Readiness: student demonstrates some foundational skills and behaviors that prepare him/her for instruction based on kindergarten standards

Emerging Readiness: student demonstrates limited foundational skills and behaviors that prepare him/her for instruction based on kindergarten standards

What is Aiken County First Steps doing to improve KRA results?

Aiken County’s results for the first year of KRA shows that overall, our students are not consistently showing complete readiness, as it relates to their abilities at the beginning of the school year. As a community convener, Aiken County First Steps is partnering with several agencies to provide early literacy materials to new parents and additional literacy services to rising five-year olds. Early Care and Education providers and teachers will receive additional training in the areas of Social Foundations, Language and Literacy, Mathematics, and Physical Development and Well-Being.

Parents play a critical role in their child's development.

Program Description

Parents as Teachers (PAT) is an evidence-based home visiting program designed to build strong communities, thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to succeed. PAT services include:

1. **Personal Visits** at least twice monthly
2. **Monthly Group Connections** with other PAT families
3. **Screenings and Assessments** to identify developmental concerns
4. **Connections to Outside Resources** that families may need to succeed

Aiken First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our PAT families:

92% ... live in poverty

38% ... didn't graduate from high school

11% ... were teen parents

This year, our Parents as Teachers program:

- ✓ Averaged 14.5 home visits per family
- ✓ Identified and addressed 3 potential developmental delays, and made 3 connections for families to services such as BabyNet and Child Find.
- ✓ Improved parenting practices with a .04 difference from pre-to post (KIPS)
- ✓ Improved literacy skills with an Adult difference of .29 and a Child difference of .37 from pre-to post.

Child Care Quality Enhancement

In order to thrive, children need nurturing, responsive relationships and a supportive learning environment, both within and outside the home.

Program Description

The quality of care they received by young children is crucial to their healthy development and school readiness. Child care providers strive to provide high quality care, but may lack the resources that are commonly available to publicly-funded early childhood programs, such as educational materials, on-site professional development, and other support.

First Steps' Child Care Quality Enhancement (QE) is intended to produce measurable improvements in the quality of care provided to young children. Participating child care providers must serve a high percentage of at-risk children, and are selected through a competitive process that requires a strong level of commitment to the QE process.

Program Components

1. On-site Technical Assistance (TA) at least twice monthly
2. Equipment and materials funding
3. Integration with locally available training, provided by First Steps and other partners
4. Workforce Development
5. Coordination with community partners
6. Pre/post assessments of the classroom environment and teacher-child interaction, using nationally-recognized observational tools for infant/toddler and preschool settings (ITERS, ECERS, FCCERS)

- ✓ Funded scholarships for 42 children within participating child care providers

Child Care Training

Those who care for young children need high-quality, accessible, and affordable professional development.

Program Description

High-quality child care hinges on high-quality professional development that meets the needs of the local child care workforce.

First Steps-sponsored training is certified through the SC Center for Child Care Career Development and includes topics in the areas of nutrition, health and safety, curriculum, child guidance, professional development and program administration. Best practices in training include not only the training itself, but follow-up in the classroom.

Child Care Scholarships

Too many families in Aiken County cannot afford quality care for their children.

Program Description

Access to quality child care is essential for children while away from their primary caregivers. Yet, of those families income-eligible for child care assistance in South Carolina, only a small fraction receive it due to lack of funds. In the absence of nurturing and consistently available family, friends or neighbors, parents are faced with few - or no - affordable care options.

Aiken First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our scholarship families:

- 66% ... live in poverty
- 66% ... single aren't household in need of other services

In addition to regular monitoring of child care providers that receive First Steps scholarships, First Steps conducts at least one developmental screening each year with scholarship children and connects families to needed services within the community.

Aiken County First Steps also integrates scholarships with the Parents as Teachers voluntary home visitation program, which has proven to be very effective. We will continue to offer PAT services to scholarship families interested in receiving them.

- ✓ Provided 42 children with scholarship assistance so their parents could work or attend school
- ✓ Identified and addressed 2 potential developmental delays among scholarship children
- ✓ Made 2 connections for families to services such as Parents as teachers and BabyNet
- ✓ Supported 7 small businesses in Aiken County by subsidizing child care tuition for families who would not otherwise be able to afford quality care
- ✓ Provided 12 hours of training for scholarship parents in topics such as What Is Quality Childcare

Evidence of Effectiveness:

Our partnership's Child Care Scholarship strategy is considered *evidence-based* because it is connected to the following evidence-based programs: Parents as Teachers.



Bringing parents and teachers together as partners sets the foundation for success in school.

Program Description

Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a summer home visitation model connecting rising kindergartners and their families with their future teachers. The program is designed:

- ✓ to forge strong and lasting home-school relationships,
- ✓ to acquaint children and families with the state and classroom expectations to increase the likelihood of school success,
- ✓ to increase parent involvement in the early grades (particularly in hard-to-reach communities), when children's learning is foundational for life success; and
- ✓ to increase public awareness of the importance of school readiness and provide ways for parents and communities to impact children's early school success.

Countdown to Kindergarten integrates all of the following:

Home Visitation. Teachers make six visits over the summer to the homes of participating students and families. Children and families are introduced to actual materials used in kindergarten and are given a Kindergarten Transition Toolkit to keep.

Learning Celebration. The last visit is a "field trip" to the school where the child will attend class in the fall.

Public Awareness. Throughout the summer, First Steps releases tips to media to help parents and caregivers get children ready for kindergarten.



What is First Steps?

At the state level and in every county, First Steps leverages state funding with other public and private resources to help South Carolina’s children enter kindergarten healthy and ready to succeed. First Steps programs and services support families as their child’s first and most important teacher and are customized to meet the unique needs of local communities, grounded in strong evidence, fueled by stakeholder collaboration, and accountable for results.

First Steps Goals

- (1) **provide parents with access to the support they might seek and want** to strengthen their families and to promote the optimal development of their preschool children;
- (2) **increase comprehensive services** so children have reduced risk for major physical, developmental, and learning problems;
- (3) **promote high-quality preschool programs** that provide a healthy environment that will promote normal growth and development;
- (4) **provide services** so all children receive the protection, nutrition, and health care needed to thrive in the early years of life so they arrive at school ready to succeed; and
- (5) **mobilize communities** to focus efforts on providing enhanced services to support families and their young children so as to enable every child to reach school healthy and ready to succeed.


